COAG endorses the National Disability Strategy

The Council of Australian Governments (COAG) has endorsed the [National Disability Strategy](#).

NDS welcomes this commitment by Australian governments to a cross-portfolio approach to improving the lives of people with disability, their families and carers. For a long time the sector has discussed the need for a cohesive and whole-of-government approach to advancing the inclusion of people with disability; but never before have all government leaders signed up to such an approach. Getting government agencies broadly to give serious

consideration to how their policies and practices can be responsive to disability issues will continue to be difficult; but without the explicit support of the heads of government it would be impossible.

The 10-year Strategy focuses on six broad outcome areas:

- inclusive and accessible communities;
- rights protection, justice and legislation;
- economic security;
- personal and community support;
- learning and skills; and
- health and wellbeing.

Work will now begin on the development of important implementation and evaluation plans; consultations are expected to occur over the coming year.

The monitoring and reporting of progress against the Strategy will occur after the first 12 months and then at two-yearly intervals. Work has begun to identify and develop robust indicators of progress, but further work is required to ensure they are adequate and appropriate measures.

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
